He is currently in Gr.10 and studies at Woburn C.I.

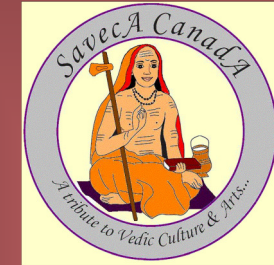
